




## **Convention Tours**


#### **TOUR 1: American Breeders Service**

American Breeders Serivce, Inc., a subsidiary of W. R. Grace & Co., is the largest A.I. organization in the Western Hemisphere. Since 1957, they have bred over one million cows per year, with the present rate at one and one-half per year.

Their product is one of genetic superiority in the form of frozen semen from the finest progeny tested beef and dairy bulls modern science can create and develop. Semen from top flight stallions in Quarter Horse, Arabian, Connemara, and Welsh Pony breeds is also available.

President of the organization is Dr. Robert E. Walton. Within A.B.S. there are seven graduate veterinarians: David Bartlett, D.V.M., vice-president in charge of production and veterinarians; Willis Parker, D.V.M., assistant veterinarian; Lester Larson, D.V.M., associate veterinarian; Julio Brouwer, D.V.M., assistant manager international division; Serjio Padilha, D.V.M., international division—Brazil; Ramon Peruga, D.V.M., international division—Spain; Kenneth Powers, D.V.M., western marketing division.





#### TOUR 2: Carnation Farms Breeding Services and Allen Hetts-Crescent Beauty Holstein Farm

Carnation Farms Breeding Service, located at Watertown, Wisconsin, is a branch of their head-quarters in the state of Washington. They have semen available from both dairy and beef breeds. Dr. Paul Didion, of Jefferson, Wisconsin, is in charge of a complete health program at the farm and conducted the tour.





Allen Hetts-Crescent Beauty Farm is located at Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin. This is one of the outstanding Holstein herds in the United States with an enviable record in the show ring.

Mr. Hetts has developed seven national champions, 38 All Americans or Reserve All Americans, and has maintained an average classification of about 88 points for several years. The lactation average of butterfat production at present is at 620 pounds.

This herd is the result of an intensive line breeding program, which was brought out by Mr. Hetts during the tour.














#### TOUR 3: Pabst Brewery and Mitchell Park Conservatory

The three glass domes of the Mitchell Park Horticultural Conservatory are unique in the world, each being 80 feet in height and 140 feet in diameter. The special exhibit for the December season was that of Christmas flowers, featuring the poinsettia.
