## BY LAWS

### ARTICLE 1: NAME

- SECTION 1: The name of this association shall be the  
AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF BOVINE PRACTITIONERS.
- SECTION 2: The association shall be INCORPORATED under the laws of the State of  
Illinois as a non-profit educational corporation.
- SECTION 3: The PRINCIPAL OFFICE of the Association shall be the office of its  
Secretary-Treasurer.\*

### ARTICLE II: OBJECTIVES

The OBJECTIVES of the Association shall be:

- SECTION 1: To endeavor to do all things necessary to promote the interests, to improve  
the public stature, and increase the knowledge of veterinarians in the field  
of dairy and beef cattle practice.
- SECTION 2: To elevate standards of bovine practice.
- SECTION 3: To attract attention to the relationship between bovine practice and the  
public interest.
- SECTION 4: To promote understanding and good will among its members.
- SECTION 5: To cooperate with veterinary and agricultural organizations and regulatory  
agencies.
- SECTION 6: ALL POWER CLAUSE: To do everything and anything reasonably and  
lawfully necessary, proper, suitable or convenient for the achievement of  
the purposes above stated, or for any of them, or for the furtherance of the  
said purposes.
