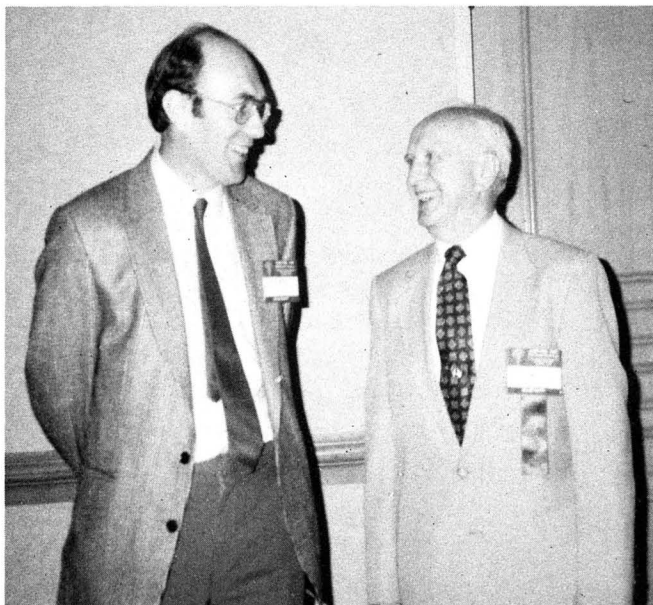


AABP Amstutz Enrichment Opportunities Program

The AABP Amstutz Enrichment Opportunities Program was announced by Dr. Simon Kenyon, Visiting Associate Professor of Population Health, Purdue University. The awards under this program are designed to encourage and help students to prepare themselves for careers in bovine practice. The program is named in honor of the unique leadership role of Dr. Harold E. Amstutz in the maturation and development of national and international organizations in the area of bovine veterinary practice.

The AABP will encourage the recruiting of outstanding students for careers in bovine veterinary practice and to provide them with unique educational experiences to maximize their preparation for bovine practice of the future. These enrichment opportunities are:

- Amstutz Summer Fellowships for veterinary students in bovine experiences.
- Amstutz Veterinary Student Scholarships for students with interest in bovine practice.

The summer \$5000 fellowship will provide a stipend of \$3000, travel allowance of \$500 and a housing and meals allowance of \$1500 to selected 1st and 2nd year students for a 12-week experience in bovine veterinary practice or in a bovine business venture.

The recipients will be required to present written and oral reports on their experience to the faculty of their re-

spective school of veterinary medicine. Two awards annually to a total cost of \$10,000 per year are anticipated.


The Student Scholarships will also be awarded annually to 4th year students selecting a clinical track in ruminant food animals, to the tune of \$5000 each. It is anticipated that two awards will be made annually.

The Awards will be administered by the Purdue University Foundation.

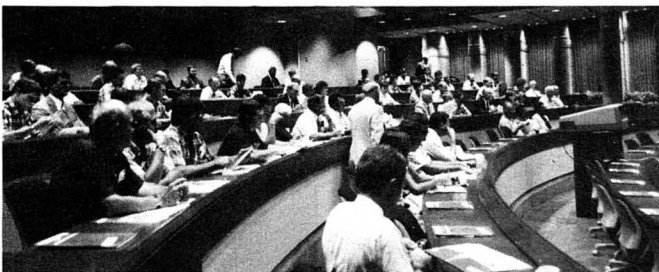
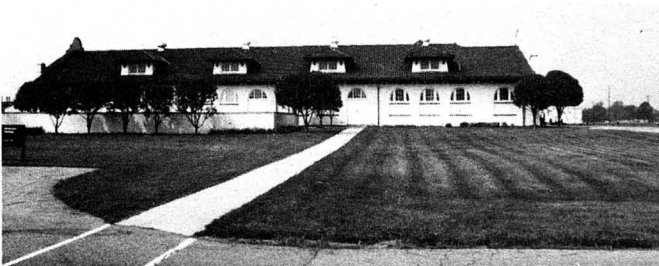




Pre-Convention Tour

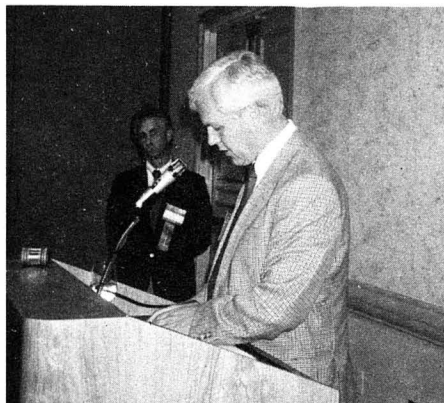
Following a tour of the facilities and lunch, the group returned to the Company's administrative center in Indianapolis for a seminar.

At a luncheon on Saturday, September 15, several representatives of veterinary colleges and organizations addressed the Board.



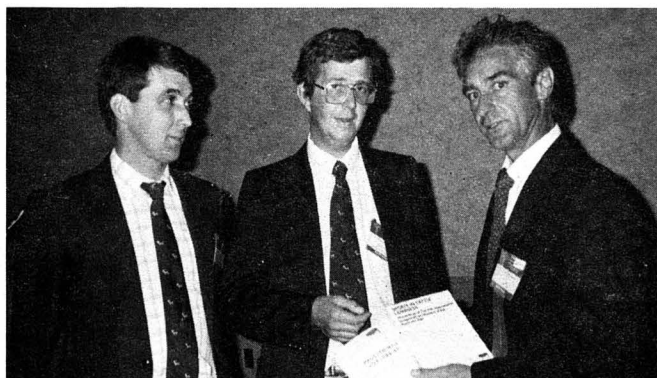

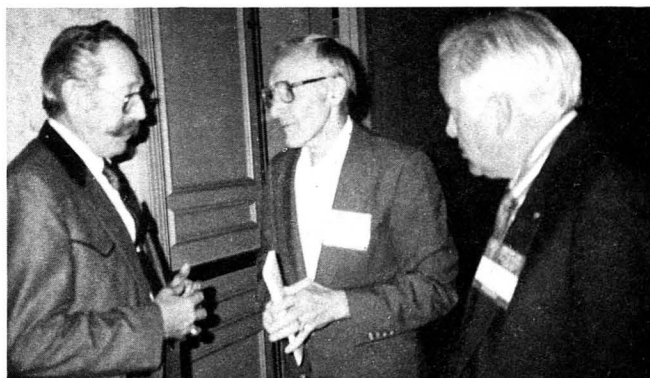
