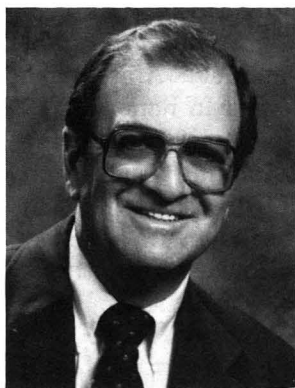


New Directors



Dr. Miles

Dr. Miles and his wife, Carol Lee, have two children - Traci and Terri. He enjoys water skiing, cross country snow skiing, hunting and reading.



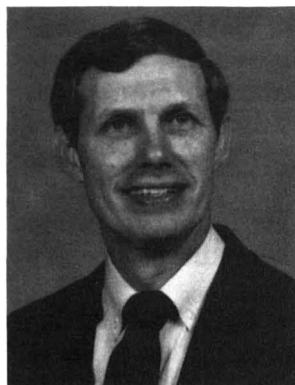
Dr. Anderson

Dr. Robert H. Keith, Monroe, Wisconsin, was presented the Stange Award at the Iowa State University Alumni Association Annual Honors and Awards Banquet at Ames, Iowa on June 6, 1992. The Award was established in honor of Dr. Charles H. Stange, Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine at ISU, 1909-1936, and is presented for outstanding professional achievements. Dr. Keith received the D.V.M. degree from ISU in 1959 and is the president of an eight-veterinarian practice at Monroe. He is a Past President of the AABP and was recently re-elected to represent the Association in the AVMA House of Delegates.

Dr. Arnold F. Hentschl, Harbor Beach, Michigan was the recipient of the AVMA Award at this year's annual convention in Boston, MA. The award is presented annually in recognition of distinguished contributions to the advancement of veterinary medical organizations. Dr. Hentschl is engaged in mixed practice with special emphasis on food animal health. He was elected to the AVMA Executive Board in 1983 and was chairman in 1987-88. He has served on the AVMA Council on Education and was chairman of the ad hoc committee to establish guidelines for the National Milk Producers Association. Dr. Hentschl was the 1980 AABP Bovine Practitioner of the Year and received the Michigan State University Distinguished Alumnus Award this year.

Dr. Leland C. Allenstein, Whitewater, Wisconsin, was selected 1992 Industry Person of the Year by World Dairy Expo. He was presented the Award at a special banquet during this year's show at Madison, WI on September 29 for his outside contributions to the dairy industry.
