# Denver: Queen City of the Plains



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Denver, the capitol city of Colorado, is one of the nation's highest, youngest, and fastest growing major cities. Founded by gold seekers in 1858 at the confluence of the South Platte River and Cherry Creek, its economic growth was based on mining, agriculture, travel, wholesale and retail trade, commercial and financial institutions, serving the Rocky Mountain West and the Great

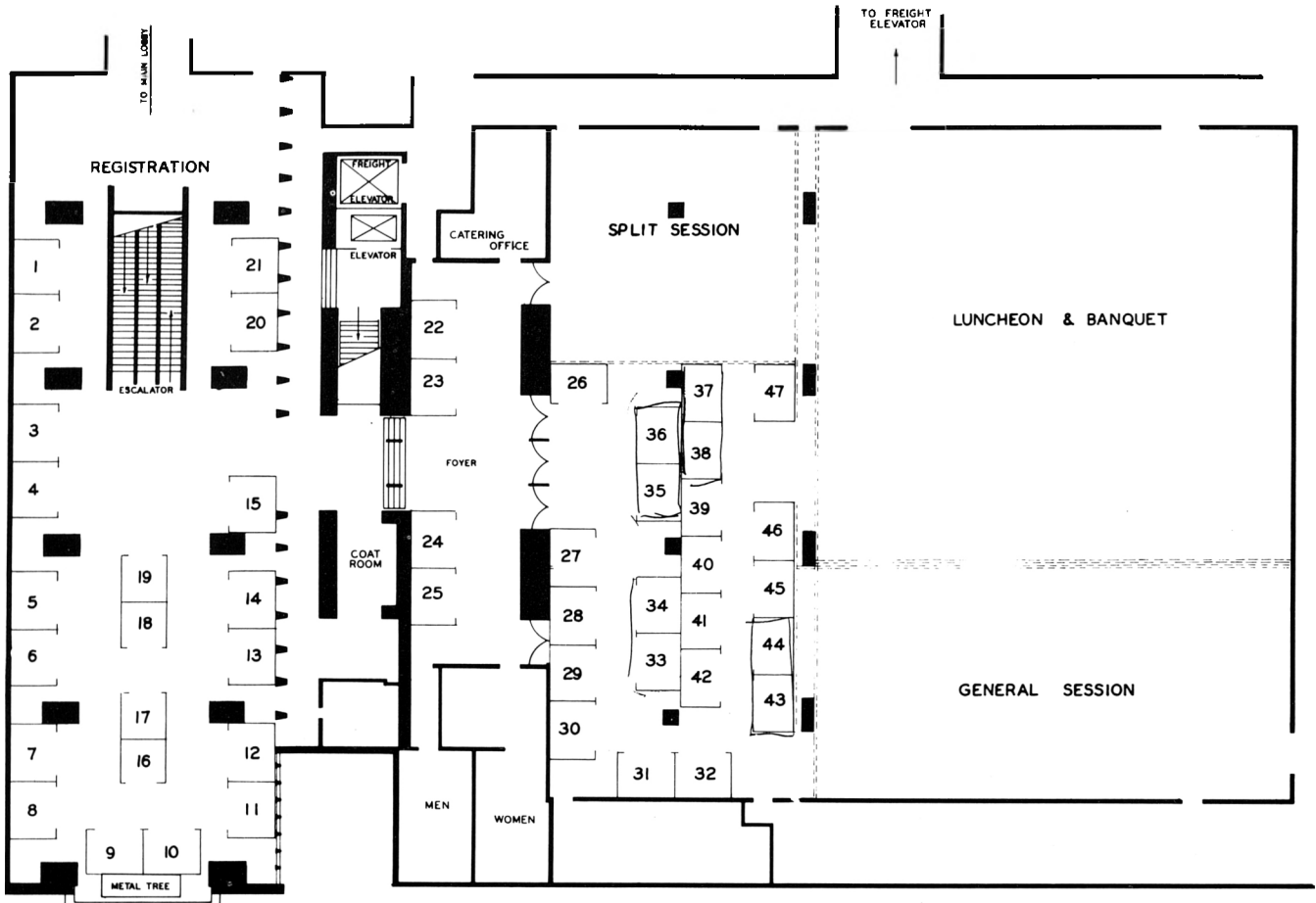

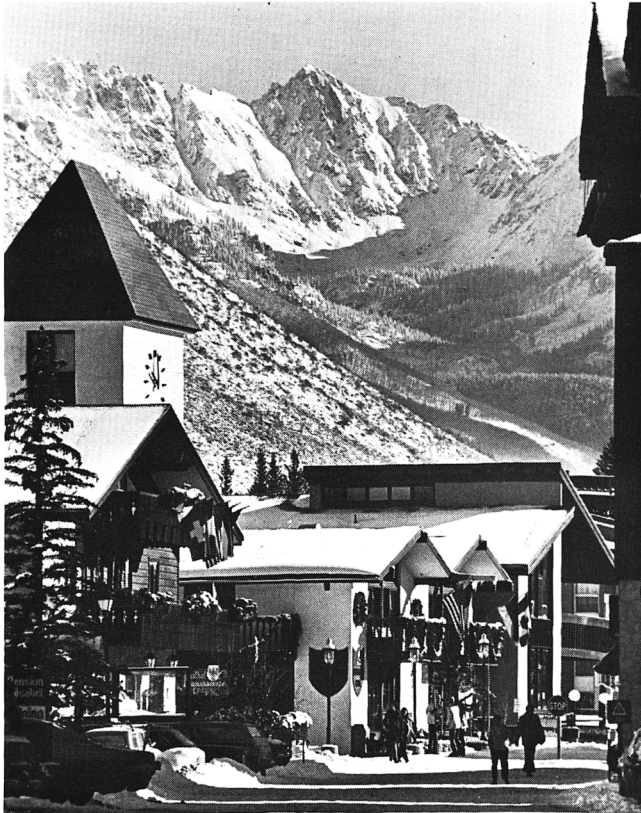

# Tour 1: Surgical Metabolic Laboratory

Colorado State University - Fort Collins, Colorado

In 1964 Colorado State University, in cooperation with N.S.H., constructed a surgical laboratory on its Foothills Campus. It is the largest and most modernly equipped veterinary surgical laboratory in the United States. Graduate study, research and surgical services are currently conducted in this facility.

Housed in the same building complex is the Colorado State University Metabolic Laboratory

where studies in metabolism and nutrition are being conducted. At present, interdisciplinary studies on the etiology, pathogenesis, metabolic imbalances, and methods of fluid and electrolyte therapy in calf scours are being conducted.

Dr. William Tietz, Dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine, C.S.U., will conduct this interesting tour which will leave the Denver Hilton Hotel at 7:00 A. M.

# Tour 2: Monfort Beef Plant Dr. John Young, Chairman



Monforts have been feeding cattle since 1930. Warren Monfort's success in cattle feeding allowed him to feed 3,500 head of cattle at one time during World War II. One time feeding capacity at the two Monfort Feedlots is in excess of 200,000 steers.

With these huge numbers of cattle on feed, a packing plant is a necessity. Monfort of Colorado now has integrated to the point that it is turning out choice fed beef in all stages. Monfort has also been a leader in marketing its beef in foreign countries such as Japan and Germany.

Monfort of Colorado now employs between 1,500 and 2,000 people, so it is a very significant employer in the Greeley, Colorado, area.

Over 20,000 visitors each year go to the Monfort facilities, and Dr. John Young will make this visit one to remember.

# Tour 3: Paclamar Farms Dr. J. W. Harrison, Chairman

Paclamar Farms is a 1,250 acre, world famous Registered Holstein-Friesian Dairy Cattle operation located 20 miles northwest of Denver, Colorado. Cattle from this farm are being sold internationally for breeding herd improvement. Bulls from Paclamar have attained great popularity in the

Holstein breed for being outstanding in genetic value of both production and type. Out of the top ten Holstein bulls in the United States for being highest for predicted difference for milk, three are bred by this organization.

Cattle are milked and housed on a near commercial basis, and have been shown, and competed with, the nation's best in these showings. A complete health program is in operation through Dr. John Harrison of Longmont, Colorado, which includes Herd Accreditation and Certification, calfhood vaccination for Brucellosis, Black Leg, IBR, along with routine checks for fertility improvement.

Paclamar Farms is a joint-venture partnership of four men, with W. R. Brooks, who is one of them, being the managing partner of the entire operation, which has been in existence eleven years.

Paclamar and their staff, headed by Mr. Brooks, will be welcoming any interested veterinarians and their families. The bus will leave the Hilton Hotel entrance at 9:00 A. M.
