

# San Diego



A City With A Mission

The Portuguese explorer, Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, was the first European to see what is now San Diego Bay. However, it was not until 1602 that Sebastian Vizcaino gave the only natural harbor on the Southern California coast its present name.

In 1796, Father Junipero Serra founded the Mission Basilica San Diego De Alcala which was the birth place of San Diego, the first outpost of the Spanish government in Alta California.

The land first sighted by Cabrillo, Port Loma, is much as it was 500 years ago - a rocky peninsula hooking into the Pacific Ocean, making the harbor an ideal achorage. The harbor has gone through a number of changes. A series of dredging projects has not only deepened the channel, but has given the city the opportunity to expand.

The Port of San Diego created the two auto-accessible peninsulas reaching into the harbor - Shelter Island and Harbor Island. Shelter Island is the center of San Diego's yachting industry where hundreds of beautiful boats anchor in its sheltering coves. The island has many yacht-related services as well as hotels, restaurants, walking paths and monuments.

Shelter Island's shape echoes that of Harbor Island which extends south into the harbor from just below the airport. Within the Harbor Island cove is the place where Vizcaino first landed.

Today, San Diego has total land area of about 320 square miles which encompasses about 72 square miles of the water area, with a population of approximately 2.6 million for the county and approximately 1,200,000 for the city was lies in the southwest corner of California, 120 miles (193 km) south of Los Angeles and 20 miles (32 km) north of Tijuana, Baja California, Mexico.

#### Climate

San Diego is reputed to have a perfect climate making it an ideal year-round destination. The average daytime temperature is  $70^{\circ}$ F (21°C) and most days are sunny. Winter temperature seldom falls below  $40^{\circ}$ F (4°C). Humidity is generally low, even during summer months. Average annual rainfall is less than 10 inches

and occurs mainly between December and March.


#### **Major Attractions**

Major attractions include the San Diego Zoo, Sea World, the San Diego Wild Animal Park and 70 miles of beaches. Other leading attractions include Old Town, Balboa Park, Cabrillo National Monument, Mission Bay Park, Seaport Village, Stephen Birch Aquarium-Museum and a variety of museums.

The San Diego Zoo houses more than 3,900 animals of nearly 800 species in its 100 acres. Recognized as one of the world's best zoos, the Zoological Society of San Diego is accredited as a museum (only five other U.S. zoos have achieved this status). Renovated habitats, like Gorilla Tropics, Sun Bear Forest, Tiger River, and the new Hippo Beach, will eventually rebuild and recognize the world famous zoo into 10 distinct climate zones with animals and plants grouped accordingly. Guided bus tours wind through the zoo's garden-like grounds and a Children's Zoo features a zoo nursery and petting kraal. The San Diego Wild Animal Park, also operated by the Zoological Society of San Diego, is an 2,150-acre nature preserve located 30 miles north of downtown San Diego. More than 3,000 wild animals, representing many endangered species, roam free over expanses resembling their native habitats in Africa and Asia.

**Sea World**, located on Mission Bay, is a 150-acre marine park featuring trained killer whales, seals, dolphins, sea lions, sea otters, and penguins. Five major shows, with performing animals, are staged throughout the day at outdoor and indoor auditoriums. Shamu Stadium, one of the largest and most technologically advanced facilities of its kind, seats 5,000 people and features a tank holding more than six million gallons of salt water. The killer-whale show features Shamu, Namu, Baby Shamu, and Nakina.



Dr. M. Gatz Riddell, Jr., Auburn, Alabama is the President, American Association of Bovine Practitioners.


Dr. Riddell was born in McPherson, Kansas. He received the B.S. degree in Arts & Sciences and also the DVM degree from Kansas State University in 1977. Dr. Riddell served an internship in Large Animal Surgery and Medicine at the College of Veterinary Medicine, Auburn University Auburn, AL from 1977 to 1978 followed by a 3 year residency in Theriogenology at the same department. For the next couple of years, he was engaged in veterinary practice at the Harrogate Hospital for Animals, Harrogate, TN (8 person mixed practice with emphasis on dairy herd health and embryo transfer). In 1982, he joined the Henderson Animal Clinic, Henderson, TN and in 1984 the Department of Large Animal Surgery and Medicine, College of Veterinary Medicine, Auburn University, as an Assistant Professor, and since October, 1995 a Professor in the Department.

Dr. Riddell became a Diplomate, American College of Theriogenologists in 1982 and received the M.S. degree in Large Animal Surgery and Medicine from Auburn University in 1984. He teaches Bovine Theriogenology, Physical Diagnosis and Dairy Clinic Rotations. He is also responsible for clinical electives in advanced reproductive technique, dairy production medicine, clinical care of client and clinic animals and full managerial responsibilities of the Large Animal Clinic Dairy Herd since 1988.

Dr. Riddell was elected to the AABP Board of Directors to represent District 3 in 1988. He served as local arrangements chairman for the 24th Annual AABP Conference in Orlando, FL in 1991. He was Seminars Chairman for the 1994 annual conference in Pittsburgh, PA. He is the Program Chairman in 1995.

Dr. Riddell received the Norden Distinguished Teachers Award in 1986 and was named the Student Government Association Outstanding Teacher in 1989. He is a member of numerous professional organizations, including the AVMA, Society for Theriogenology, National Mastitis Council, Society for the Study of Reproduction; Diplomate, American College of Theriogenology; he is also a member of Phi Kappa Phi, Phi Zeta and Sigma XI. In addition to activities at Auburn College of Veterinary Medicine. Dr. Riddell performs the following primarily for AABP on the AVMA Drug Advisory Committee, FDA/CVM Task Force on Professional Flexible Labeling and USDA working group on policy formation for addressing the Bovine Sporadic Encephalopathy Creutzfeldt - Jacob disease (BSE/ CJD) issue. He has published several papers on his research work in food animal theriogenology. Dr. Riddell has presented papers at many local, state and national meetings.

Dr. Riddell's wife, Kay, is a veterinarian coordinating the functions of an *in vitro* fertilization laboratory for cattle. They have three children: Molly 9, active in school and ballet; Wes, 7, participates in City league basketball and baseball; Jonathan, 3, directs most family activity. ## A Message From The President

Welcome to the first phase of the new AABP publication schedule. It's exciting to me to see one of the top ranked (as identified in a membership survey) member services being expanded. The current transition year publication schedule is the 1995 *Proceedings* (January '96), the *Bovine Practitioner* (May - June '96), and the 1996 *Proceedings* (September '96). This will lead into the 1997 publications schedule of a two-volume *Bovine Practitioner* (January and May) and the Annual Meeting *Proceedings* in September.

The Practitioner is offering the option of peerreview for papers coming from the academic ranks. We promise that the reviews will be timely, credible and scientific. It is the intent of the Editor and the AABP Board of Directors to provide a forum for the most current scientific information available from researchers at the university and industry levels. However, it is the Practitioner, and we also want it to be a forum for those practice hints and tips that make everyone's practice day easier and more productive. Both of these intentions should give you the tools needed to provide top notch service to the clients and industries which we serve.

After all is said and done, the 1995 meeting in San Antonio was a tremendous success. My heartfelt gratitude goes to all of the AABP Program Committee and the Society for Theriogenology. This combination meeting was so successful that the Board of Directors has approved plans for repeat performances with the SFT in 1997 in Montreal and 1999 in Nashville. This collaborative effort allowed those in attendance the opportunity to receive the benefit of two meetings for little more than the price of one.

The Board of Directors continues to focus upon the Mission Statement of the AABP. The continuing education of our members remains the primary mission and changes are ongoing with the format of the Program Committee to maintain the Annual Meeting as the premiere CE opportunity available. We are also striving to increase awareness and provide leadership for issues critical to the cattle industries.

Some of the areas of concern for membership which AABP leadership has tried to address as the year has unfolded include the FDA ban on extra-label use of flouroquinolone antibiotics. Educating membership on this topic was considered critical to facilitating approval for fluoroquinolone products with bovine labels currently in the approval process. Another area of concern from a regulatory standpoint is the use of the ionophores in lactating dairy cattle. These substances will be a valuable tool when they do become approved. **Unapproved use of a feed additive is illegal and cannot be condoned.** 

Drug availability has been a constant problem for more than a decade. There are several ongoing efforts to address new drug approvals. A co-sponsored (FDA/CVM, AVMA, AHI) effort to create a Professional Flexible Label utilized the results of two symposiums (April and December 1995) to create a Task Force to develop such a label. The Task Force has completed the initial phase and a "strawman" label has been published in the May 15 issue of JAVMA. I would like to ask each AABP member to review this label and provide input back to AVMA and the Task Force. It is up to each of us to provide input on this issue which could have a very positive impact on the therapeutic armamentarium we take to our patients every day. The Animal Drug Availability Act, with its amendment pertaining to a Veterinary Feed Order, has the potential for speeding and facilitating the drug approval process.

I am somewhat hesitant to even start on the most recent issue facing bovine practitioners. Whatever I write now will be significantly different by publication date. The tenuous association between Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) and Cruetzfeldt-Jacob Disease (CJD) in Britain has captured the headlines in recent times. This is an issue that will not go away and what every AABP members needs to remember is that we are all integral components in the monitoring, surveillance, and educational phases of keeping the U.S. cattle population BSE free. Canadian health professionals and cattle industries faced a similar situation in 1993 very successfully with a proactive approach.

Dr. Don Hansen (chair) and the AABP Food Safety Committee have been very active in the early phases of the U.S. response as the AABP was asked to contribute from the very beginning. Dr. Hansen represented us at two USDA sponsored meetings and placed AABP in a lead role for the health professions and cattle industries. We are now involved in a working group to direct further actions, including FDA/ CVM rule-making pertaining to a ban on ruminant protein to ruminant feeding.

Lastly, I would like to emphasize how enjoyable it has been to represent you and work for the AABP so far this year. The AABP office in Rome, Georgia with Ms. Leigh-Ann Hunt and Dr. Jim Jarrett have been more than invaluable. I appreciate all of their help during some busy times this year and their indulgences as I have invaded their working environment from time to time. The Board of Directors is always at work to keep the AABP focused on the needs of membership. I have to give a sincere thanks to Past President Reilly Glore for dragging us onto the information superhighway. The e-mail system we use has been a very efficient means of facilitating Board action.

The liaisons that the AABP has with many health professional and industry groups have been enjoyable to encounter and maintain this year. But, most importantly, the support that the AABP receives from each of our members is most gratifying and appreciated. The AABP office and Board always strives to put membership first; please let us know when you think we succeed and when you think there is more that could be done. Thank you and see you in San Diego.

Dr. Emile Bouchard, St-Hyacinthe, Quebec, Canada is the new Director for AABP District 12.





## In Memoriam



### Prof. Dr. Jacques Espinasse Toulouse, France

Professor Doctor Jacques Espinasse, President of the World Association for Buiatrics, (WAB) died at his home near Toulouse, France on March 15, 1996 after a long illness which he faced with exemplary bravery.

Professor Doctor Espinasse was born on August, 17, 1937. He finished secondary school in 1955 and studied veterinary medicine at the Ecole National Vétérinaire in Toulouse from 1956 to 1960. After graduation, he fulfilled his military duty (1960-62) and then joined the clinic for Internal Medicine of Farm Animals at the Toulouse Veterinary School: In 1964 & 1965, he obtained his certificates for advanced studies in medical biology and biological chemistry, respectively, and qualified as a lecturer in 1968.

In 1977, Professor Dr. Espinasse became Professor and Head, Bovine Medicine Department at the National Veterinary School, Alfort, France where he established extramural practical courses which were introduced into the veterinary training program at that time. In 1987, Professor Dr. Espinasse became Head, Associated Laboratory of the National Agronomy Research Institute in Pathophysiology and Pathophysiology of Ruminant Respiratory Disease at Toulouse.

In 1972, Professor Dr. Espinasse founded the French Society for Buiatrics and was elected its first President. He and his colleagues organized the excellent IX World Association for Buiatrics (WAB) Congress in Paris, France in 1976. Professor Dr. M. Stöber, WAB Secretary at that time wrote. "That meeting was not only an outstanding scientific event, it also brought research workers and practitioners from all over the world in close contact with French Buiatrists. Under his inspiring enthusiasm and leadership, French Buiatrics experienced on impressive revival."

Professor Dr. Espinasse was elected Vice President of WAB in 1976 and President in 1984. He was a member of the Académie Vétérinaire de France, Secretary-General French Committee of the World Veterinary Association, Honorary Member, Israeli Latino American and Italian Buiatrics Associations, He served on the Editorial Board of the Technical and Scientific Journal of the Office International for Epizootics and represented France on the Committee for Veterinary Medical Products and on the European Economic Committee.

He received the Veterinary Medicine Merit of Brazil, and the Order of Merit for French Agriculture. Professor Dr. Espinasse published over 180 scientific articles, 43 books and brochures and 9 video films. The large number of co-authors engaged in these publications proves his high esteem of team work between practice and science.

With the death of Professor Dr. Espinasse, the French Society for Buiatrics and his colleagues world wide are losing their nevertiring prominent representative. Friends and colleagues remember him with gratitude and respect.

On behalf of his colleagues throughout the world, we express our sincere condolences to his wife and daughters who, by their self-sacrificing assistance, contributed so much to his life work.

## In Memoriam



### Dr. Eli Mayer Haifa, Israel

Doctor Eli Mayer, Vice President of the World Association for Buiatrics, died at his home in Haifa, Israel on March 3, 1996

Born in Heidelberg, Germany on January 29, 1925, Dr. Mayer emigrated with his parents to Palestine in 1933. After secondary school education, he served for three years in the Royal Air Force. In 1947, he entered Ecole Nationale Vétérinaire in Lyon, France where he received his veterinary doctor diploma in 1953.

Dr. Mayer returned to Israel (founded in 1948) and was engaged in veterinary practice in the Negev district for 10 years. In 1965, he became director of the Clinical Service of "Hackaklaith", a national cooperative institution employing most of the large animal practitioners in Israel. He developed this system towards an exemplary herd health service, thus creating the world wide fame of the high yielding dairy cows of Israel. He initiated scientific research and was personally engaged in buiatrical investigation. With this in mind, he established international contacts which developed links between colleagues in many countries. The published results of numerous cooperative projects found interest all over the world: He was fluent in several languages.

One of the highlights of his career was the organization of the XI World Congress for Buiatrics in Tel Aviv, Israel in 1980.

Dr. Mayer was President, Israeli Veterinary Association; Member of the Board, World Veterinary Association, Vice President, World Association for Buiatrics; founding Member and President, French -Israeli and German - Israeli Veterinary Associations. He received honorary membership in several scientific societies, and medals of honor. Dr. Mayer was named Israeli Veterinarian of the Year on two occasions. He was a correspondent Member, Académie Vétérinaire de France and of the German Veterinary Society.

Dr. Mayer retired in 1990 but remained active as Director of the Institute for Clinical and Epidemiological Veterinary Research which had been established by his initiative and in animal welfare

His friendship and leadership was highly appreciated by his German colleagues towards whom - after the terrible events of the Nazi era, he was among the first to offer reconciliation. In acknowledgment of his efforts towards the mutual understanding of people, he received the German Order of Merit in 1985.

The World Association for Buiatrics is bowing in graceful respect to its outstanding and beloved member and friend, Dr. Eli Mayer. Many bovine practitioners from around the world will recall the informative and insightful opening lectures he presented at several WAB Congresses. Dr. Amstutz recalls that "it was always a highlight of WAB Congresses to share ideas and experiences with this intelligent and caring colleague. He was truly a veterinarian of the world."

The Buiatrics Family around the world expresses deep sympathy to his wife and children.


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
