Dr. Elmer Woelffer Honored

Dr. Elmer Woelffer, Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, was unanimously elected an Honorary Member of AABP during the convention.

According to the AABP by-laws, "Honorary members shall be those persons who have made noteworthy and outstanding contributions to bovine practice. Unanimous approval of the executive board is required for candidates in this category."

Speaking on behalf of the executive board, Dr. Leland Allenstein said it was a unique honor and privilege for him to announce the board's decision at the annual general meeting. Dr. Woelffer is a native of Waterloo, Wisconsin. He received the B.S.A. from the University of Wisconsin in 1922 and the D.V.M. degree from Cornell University in 1931. From 1933-47 he was farms manager and veterinarian for H.P. Hood & Sons, Boston, Mass. He was a member of the faculty at the University of Illinois, 1947-50, and veterinarian and vice president of Pabst Farms in Oconomowoc from 1950 to 1952. For many years Dr. Woelffer has conducted a consultant prac-

tice, specializing in bovine infertility. He is well known throughout the dairy cattle world as veterinary editor of *Hoard's* Dairyman.

Dr. Woelffer has served on many committees and has received many honors. He has served as president, Certified Milk Producers Association of America; secretary-treasurer, New England Veterinary Association; president and secretarytreasurer, Massachusetts Veterinary Association; served on the State Board of Examiners, Commonwealth of Massachusetts; chairman, AVMA Professional Liability Insurance Trust; member, AVMA Executive Board; past president, Wisconsin VMA; past president, Oconomowoc Rotary Club; member, American College of Theriogenology; Agricultural Advisory Committee, Oconomowoc High School; and member, Waukesha County VMA.

Honors bestowed on Dr. Woelffer include the Champion Herdsman's Award, National Dairy Exposition (3 years), Honorary Chapter Farmer of Oconomowoc FFA, Veterinarian of the Year for Wisconsin VMA in 1966, Distinguished Service Award from the University of Wisconsin College of Agriculture and Life Sciences in 1973, and Man of the Year Award from Tri-State Breeders Coop. in 1976.

Dr. Woelffer's enormous contributions to the profession and his community are a source of pride to his colleagues everywhere. He joins Dr. James Herriot as the only veterinarians to be elected to honorary membership of the American Association of Bovine Practitioners.
